Reactive oxygen species (ROS) manifest effects that encompass both beneficial physiological functions as well as damaging alterations of cellular components. Indeed, normal functioning of the immune system, both innate and adaptive mechanisms, involve acute ROS production and intricately regulated redox signaling. A dysfunctional immune system resulting from oxidative stress and chronic inflammation are now known to be responsible for the initiation, progression, and therapeutic resistance of numerous diseases.
