Deadline for manuscript submissions: closed (20 May 2023) The presence of air pollutants has prominent impacts on human, ecosystem, and crop health, and thus it is critical to improve air quality assessments and predictions across scales. In response to this concern about air pollution, there have been significant reductions in anthropogenic emissions over the last decades in many parts of the world, thus leading to relatively "cleaner" atmospheric conditions in some regions. Consequently, more emphasis has been placed on understanding the roles of natural emissions. Numerous world regions have experienced events leading to significantly worsened air quality conditions.

To highlight such efforts in the scientific community, we are inviting the submission of research papers that investigate improved methods, applications, and evaluations of air quality assessments and predictions across scales. Papers that delve into the interplay between anthropogenic and natural source emissions and how they affect atmospheric composition and air quality are also encouraged. Finally, papers using novel measurement techniques, observations, and analysis/statistical methods to evaluate air quality model predictions across scales are welcome.
