Message from the Guest Editors

Dear Colleagues,

Insects are known to be severe pests that are detrimental to artefacts, museums, monuments, paintings, and to cultural heritage in general. It is worth mentioning that, on the other hand, their products (e.g. wax, silk, lac, etc.) have been largely used in art, as in other aspects of culture, and that insects (honey bees, butterflies, flies, stag beetles, etc.) are important symbols that are often represented in paintings and sculptures, as well as in books or heraldry, all over the world.
