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Message from the Guest Editors

Dear Colleagues,

Iron is a highly abundant element in the lithosphere, and Fe oxides, Fe-bearing phyllosilicate minerals, Fe sulfides, and other Fe-bearing minerals are common constituents of soils and sediments. As such, redox-active Fe-bearing minerals are key players in electron transfer reactions involved in the biogeochemical cycling of elements and the transformation of organic and inorganic contaminants in both natural and engineered redox dynamic environments.

We invite contributions relating to, but not limited to, laboratory and field studies of the transformations of Fe-bearing minerals via abiotic and microbially-driven redox reactions; the coupling of redox reactions of Fe-bearing minerals with the biogeochemical cycling of critical elements (e.g., N, P, and S); and the impacts of Fe redox reactions on contaminant transformation, fate, and transport in aquatic and terrestrial environments. We especially encourage multidisciplinary studies that use cutting-edge approaches such as advanced imaging and spectroscopic techniques, isotopic analysis, and omics-based molecular microbiology.
